Toronto's Urban Wilderness

To date, 302, plus 11 recently introduced and exotic species, have been recorded at the park. The first checklist, Birds of the Leslie Street Spit, was produced by the Friends of the Spit in 1988.

In 2001, Tommy Thompson Park/Leslie Street Spit was declared an "Important Bird Area" of global significance due to the presence of significant concentrations of the following colonial waterbirds: Ring-billed Gulls, Black-crowned Night-Herons and Common Terns. Another factor was the large concentration of songbirds that migrate through the area during the spring and fall.

A number of restoration activities have been initiated to improve the terrestrial and aquatic habitat of the site. Areas of focus have been the toplands area, the western embayments and the inner cells.

Over 6 per cent of the world's breeding population of Ring-billed Gulls can be found at the Tommy Thompson Park/Leslie Street Spit (approximately 55,000 pairs). Impressive numbers of Black-crowned Night-Herons can also be found; 31 per cent (1,265 nests) of Canada's breeding population was recorded at the site in 2000.

Large colonies of Double-crested Cormorants can be observed on Peninsulas A, B and C. Cormorants are competing for nest trees with the Black-crowned Night-Herons and have displaced them from Peninsula A and parts of Peninsula B. The primary Black-crowned Night-Heron colony is now restricted to parts of Peninsulas B and C. Note the difference in nest construction between these two species. A total of 6,125 cormorant nests were counted in 2006, plus 649 night-heron nests.

The Common Tern (the Tommy Thompson Park logo bird), is a beneficiary of the gull control program and habitat improvements, which include the nesting rafts provided by Toronto and Region Conservation (TRCA) and the Canadian Wildlife Service, in Cell 2 and Embayment D. Approximately 90 pairs of terns nest on each raft annually. In addition to the rafts, permanent tern nesting islands have been constructed in the Cell 1 wetland.

The park is an excellent place to observe owls throughout the winter. Look for Snowy Owls on the rocky parts of the endikement. Other species such as Great Horned, Northern Saw-whet, Boreal, Barred, Short-eared and Long-eared Owls can be found on the more sheltered western peninsulas. Please do not disturb roosting owls. If photographing, do not approach them and do not use a flash.

Sightings of birds which are regionally or provincially rare should be documented and the information submitted to the Ontario Bird Records Committee (OBRC), care of TRCA and/or Friends of the Spit.

Enjoy the park, tread softly, take only memories and return often. And, please remember the park is Toronto's only car-and-dog-free wilderness.

A	Accidental: Status based on very few records; often out of geographic range. Require documentation.
